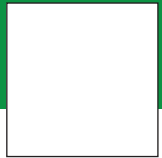

Cordless power tools (e.g. leaf blowers, drills, saws, grinders, lawn mowers), Cordless phones, Flashlights, Laptops, Tablets, Cellphones, Two-way Radio, Biomedical Equipment, Children's Toys, Singing Greeting Cards, Keyless entry remotes, E-Cigarettes, Electronic Toothbrushes, Smoke Detectors and Remote Controls



Note: Alkaline batteries (e.g. AA, AAA batteries) can be safely disposed of in the trash. Please safely dispose of all other batteries at a drop-off site near you to keep our workers safe.
