GOAL

All Children, Youth, and Families have Positive Experiences

RESULT

All young people feel safe at home, school, and in their community

WHY THIS MATTERS

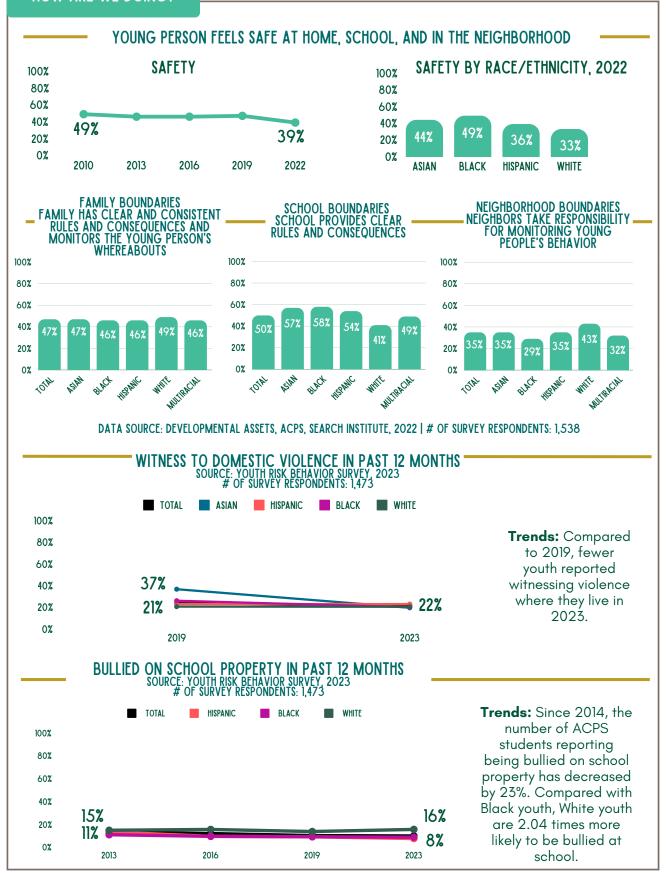
Young people need reliable access to places and relationships where they feel safe to freely express themselves without fear of judgment or retribution, explore their world, identity, feelings, interests, and opinions, and develop skills and a sense of belonging. Having a place where they are physically, socially, and emotionally secure and supported by trusted, caring, and competent adults who set clear boundaries while treating them fairly and with respect is imperative for healthy development. These spaces are equally important across the many aspects of a child's life including school, home, and the community.

When children feel physically and psychologically safe, supported, and nurtured in their homes, schools, and communities, they are more likely to develop healthy relationships, engage in prosocial behaviors, succeed in school, participate in programs, and contribute positively to their communities. Safe and stable environments that foster inclusion and belonging, center healing, and are free from harm provide children with the security they need to explore, learn, and develop essential skills, such as problem-solving, communication, and emotional regulation, which are crucial for success in all aspects of life.

While all youth have the need to feel safe, these spaces are especially important for youth who are more likely to be impacted by injustice, violence, and discrimination. For example, promoting safe and supportive environments can be particularly helpful for LGBTQ+, who are more likely to be bullied at school and may lack family support at home.

By ensuring that every family, school, and neighborhood is equipped to create environments that support people who have experienced traumatic events like abuse, witnessing violence, bullying, family separation, displacement, and discrimination, and prevent these adversities from ever happening, we can foster a more inclusive, resilient, and supportive society that encourages young people to envision what they want to become, and who they want to be.

- Sustaining the Alexandria Crisis Intervention Training Program to provide jail diversion for individuals experiencing a mental health crisis
- Developing steps that will meet the goals of the commonwealth of Virginia's Marcus Alert System Plan
- Monitoring and engaging in the establishment and implementation of the Alexandria Community Policing Review Board
- Exploring youth criminal justice best practices such as restorative justice, youth court, and other similar programs
- Establishing pathways to connect impacted community members to resources to promote a holistic integration back into the community

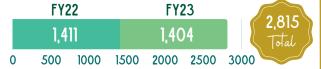

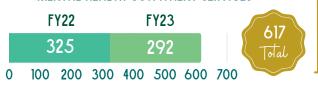

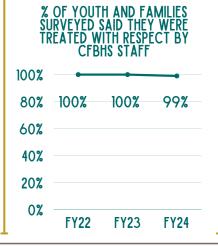

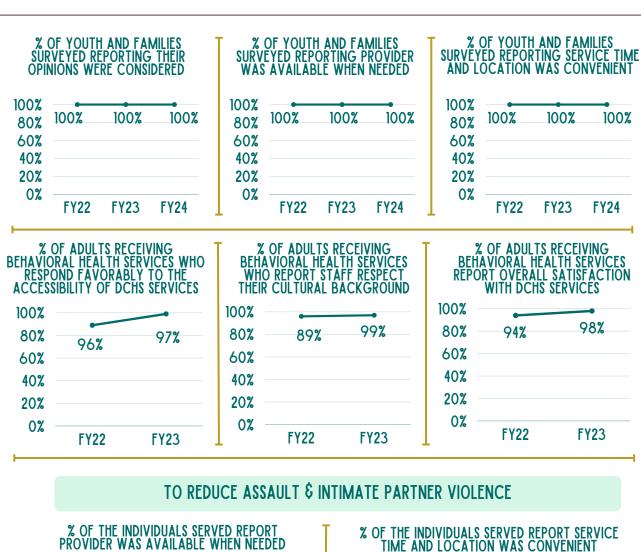

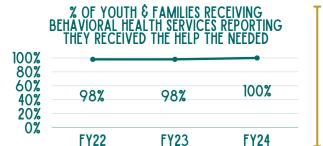

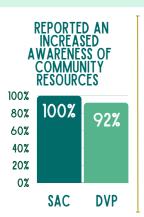

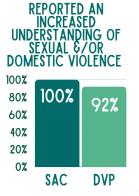

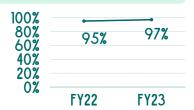
