

TITLE: CREATION OF TWO NEW SUBCOMMITTEES AND REACTIVATION OF THE BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS SUBCOMMITTEE.

ISSUE: Creation of three subcommittees that seek to improve efficiency, performance, and decision

-making for City Council.

RECOMMENDATION: That City Council create the following subcommittees:

(2) Subcommittee on Personnel; and

Subcommittee on Boards and Commissions

bli shed prior to the BACKGROUND: At the November 12, 2024, Legislative meeting, Councilwoman Gaskins requested that the above referenced subcommittees be esta appointment of councilmembers to boards, commissions, committees, subcommittees at the installation ceremony on January 2, 20 25. City Council should approve the request so that the subcommittees would be established before the installation of the incoming Council on January 2, 2025.

Below is an overview of the proposed subcommittees and their scope of work:

- Subcommittee for the Review of Standing Committees
- This subcommittee will review the current standing committees and determine if Council should move to a different standing committee structure and what impact on staffing and current advisory committees a change may have.
- 2. Subcommittee on Personnel
- City Council is responsible for the performance evaluation of the City Manager, City Attorney, City Cle rk and the Independent Police Review Auditor. This subcommittee would be responsible for establishing clear metrics for successful management and evaluation of these positions.
- 3. Subcommittee on Boards and Commissions
- o review the process This would be a reactivation of a previous subcommittee established pre -pandemic. The new goal of this subcommittee would be t of creating and structuring existing boards and commissions, while making recommendations on the viability and necessity of a Il active boards and commissions

The composition of each new subcommittee would include two to three council members and would be supported by key staff membe rs to be determined by the City Manager. Each subcommittee would have a specified time to complete the work.



Sub Committees

Unlike traditional, permanent City Council standing committees, Alexandria has a robust history of establishing temporary sub-committees that often address a specific issue and then sunset after a specified amount of time.



The **Standing Committee Model** is a governance structure where city councils have permanent standing committees established to address specific ongoing areas of responsibility or policy, ensuring consistent work and decision-making in those areas over time.



Definition of Standing Committees

Sec. 2-4-2 - Definitions.

As used in this article, unless otherwise stated or the context otherwise requires:

. .

(2) Committee means any board, committee, commission, authority or similar body established by the city council or established pursuant to, or required by, any provision of the laws or regulations of the Commonwealth of Virginia or the United States, which has one or more members appointed or designated by the city council, and which has (i) a fixed membership, including at least one person who is not a city employee, (ii) a defined purpose and (iii) regular or periodic meetings.

- (6) Standing committee means any committee established pursuant to law whose functions are established on a permanent, ongoing basis for an indefinite period of time.
- Sec. 2-4-4 Composition, terms and duties of committees.

. . .

- (d) Additional duties for standing committees. In addition to any other function or duty that may be vested in a committee by its enabling legislation or otherwise, each standing committee shall:
- (1) hold at least one regular meeting each year and as many additional meetings as may be required by its enabling legislation or as the business of the committee may require.
- (2) prepare and submit to the city council an annual report within 60 days after the close of the fiscal year or as shortly thereafter as possible. The report shall include, but not be limited to, a listing of the members of the committee, a description of the committee's principal activities during the reporting period and any recommendations of the committee for improving its functions and duties or making changes in other laws, procedures, policies or programs within the subject matter of its jurisdiction, including recommendations for additional federal or state legislation. These reports shall become available for public inspection and copying after submission to the city council.
- (3) in addition to its annual report, any committee is authorized to make additional or special reports, oral or written, to the city manager of the city council at any other time that the committee determines that such reports may be needed, except that, no report requesting additional city funds or staff shall be submitted to the city council until it shall first have been submitted to the city manager for his comments and recommendations.
- (4) prepare, in consultation with the city manager an annual budget, showing both the funding and staff directly assigned to the committee and estimated sums and staff time that may be used by the committee but are not directly assigned to it.
- (5) prepare by-laws consistent with this code regulating procedures regarding the committee mission, membership, meetings, officers, committees, and amendments. Such by-laws should be filed with the office of the city clerk and reviewed by the committee annually.

- (a) Any new standing committee shall be established by ordinance.

Key Elements:

- ☐ Composition: The Committee is currently comprised of two (3) members of the City Council and a Staff Liaison from the Department of Recreation, Parks & Cultural Activities.
- ☐ <u>Meeting Frequency:</u> The Committee convenes approximately every other month but also meets as needed, decided by the members of the Committee.

Responsibilities:





Pros & Cons





Pros

- Specialization: Members can focus on specific topics, gaining deeper expertise and improving decision-making.
- **Efficiency**: Allows for more in-depth discussions and streamlined processes before presenting to the full council.
- **Transparency**: Regular, public committee meetings can improve accountability and stakeholder engagement.
- **Continuity**: Ongoing committees ensure preparedness and consistent oversight, even as broader council priorities shift.

Cons

- Fragmentation: Specialized focus might create silos, making it harder to address crosscutting issues.
- Time Demands: Council members may face increased workloads and challenges balancing committee and full council responsibilities.
- Potential for Power Imbalances: Some committees might gain outsized influence compared to others.
- Resource Intensive: Committees require additional staff support, scheduling, and administrative work.


