SENATE BREAKDOWN




Senate (21 D - 19 R)







VETO SESSION & THE BUDGET

- Legislation:
 - Governor Youngkin:
 - Signed 599 bills, amended 159 bills, & vetoed 157 bills
 - General Assembly accepted 69 of the Governor's amendments and returned 91 original bills & the budget to his desk
- Budget:
 - General Assembly delivered a bipartisan budget to the Governor that prioritized clean water, some land conservation, and RGGI protection
 - Governor Youngkin sent down 8 hard item veteos & 205 budget amendments
 - The General Assembly accepted 33 of those amendments, rejected the rest, and sent the amended budget back to Youngkin for consideration

Final Environmental Policy Results





GOVERNOR'S FINAL ACTIONS

Legislation:

- General Assembly accepted 69 of the Governor's legislative amendments and sent 91 original bills & the budget to his desk
- As of May 2nd 11:59pm, Governor Youngin has signed 53 bills of those bills, and vetoed the remaining 38


Budget:

- Governor Youngkin sent down 8 hard item veteos & 205 budget amendments
 - The General Assembly accepted 33 of those amendments and sent the amended budget back to Youngkin for consideration.
 - Of the 172 items that the General Assembly sent back to the Gov, he approved
 135 and line item vetoed 37, totalling in a \$900M reduction in spending.

BILL SPOTLIGHTS

Water


- Efforts to shift stormwater management and agriculture BMPs \$\$ from the Chesapeake Bay Watershed were defeated.
- No new good plastics bills (such as HB 1618) were passed, but no bad bills were passed either. A study on updating the Litter Tax was passed (HJ 448), and the foam ban remains intact.
- Wetlands Taskforce (HB 2034) was amended and signed.
- o A tree canopy bill (HB 2630) was passed and signed.
- o The Blue Catfish bill (HB 2782) was vetoed.
- The Joint Subctte on Recurrent Flooding was resurrected via HJ 437.
- o A coastal storm risk management JLARC study (HJ 437) passed.
- One PFAS bill passed (HB 2050) and one was vetoed (SB 1319).



BILL SPOTLIGHTS

• Land Use & Transportation:


- Invasive Plants bill (HB 1941 & SB 1166) passed & was signed.
- Virginia's Great Outdoors Act (HB 2059) was heard but left in a House Appropriations subcommittee.
- Wildlife Corridors (HB 2025 & SB 1341) was defeated.
- Oak Hill Park (HB 2306) was defeated in the Senate after being sent back to ctte from the floor.
- Rural EV legislation (HB 1791) was vetoed, but the state of the budget language is uncertain.
- Advanced Clean Car Standards repeal (SB 806)
 was defeated in the Senate.



BILL SPOTLIGHTS

Energy:

- OSW Workforce Dev (HB 1616) was vetoed.
- DG (HB 1883 / SB 1040) was vetoed after Gov amendments were rejected.
- Virtual Power Plants (HB 2346 / SB 1100) was signed in its original form.
- o Solar schools (HB 1934 / SB 1192) was signed in its original form.
- The Interconnection bill (HB 2266 / SB 1058) was amended and signed.
- The Low Income EE & Weatherization bill (HB 1935 / SB 777) was vetoed.
- The IRP bill (HB 2413 / SB 1021) was vetoed.
- All data center bills except for HB 2084 were either defeated or vetoed.
