A Tavern at Work

Gadsby's Tavern Museum

Ideal for students studying Colonial and Early America, students use primary sources to understand urban slavery and the challenges faced by 18th c. residents and travelers through the lens of the tayern business.

Studying the Past

Why would a ship be found underground? Use dendrochronology and other scientific methods to uncover the mystery behind Alexandria's 18th century ship discovered along the waterfront

Hayti: Uncovering an African-American Neighborhood*

Weave together maps, census records, and artifacts from the site of a free Black community to understand the people who lived there.

How has medicine changed over time? Learn about past practices and tools of the trade through a guided, hands-on tour of the museum.
