## Measles Preparedness Checklist

Is your practice ready for a measles case?

We identified a measles preparedness champion to guide our preparation efforts.
We reviewed and communicated our office's febrile rash protocol to staff and visitors.
We verified all staff's immunity to measles.
We have a list of immune and non-immune staff ready to share with the health department in case we have an exposure.
We trained all staff on measles symptoms and infection control.
We used the CDC Project FirstLine Measles Microlearn, linked below.
We supplied our clinic with appropriate PPE.
If we use N95 respirators in our office, all staff are up to date on annual fit testing.
We know how to quickly identify exposed staff and visitors.
We have a plan for notifying exposed visitors and prepared a template letter.
We know how to reach our local health department for reporting suspect cases and consultation on rapid measles testing.
We know which specimens to collect for measles.
We proactively supplied our clinic with specimen collection kits from LabCorp, Quest, or VDH.
We proactively recommend routine MMR vaccination and an early MMR dose for infants 6-11 months who will be traveling to an outbreak setting and/or internationally.
As patients' #1 trusted advisors, we are prepared to address vaccine concerns.
We shared MMR literature/posters in our office.
