1. Call to Order/Introductions by Chair Poole

Chair Pool called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Introductions were made.

2. Approval of Agenda

Upon a motion by Commissioner Sprague, seconded by Commissioner Prince, the Agenda was approved, with changes. All Commissioners present voted aye.

3. Approval of Minutes of the September Meeting

Upon a motion by Commissioner Sprague, seconded by Commissioner Lewis, the November minutes were approved, with changes. All Commissioners present voted aye.

4. Guest speakers

Rachel M Drescher, Urban Planner III, Department of Planning & Zoning

Ms. Drescher stated that she wanted to reach out to the Commission to get the Commission's input and feedback on A-Frames signs. A-Frame signs are advertisement signs that businesses are placing on the sidewalk to draw attention to the business. Chair Poole asked the City's position and regulation on A-Frame signs currently. The signs, at this time, are not regulated by city Code but are regulated by state and federal accessibility requirements. Ms. Drescher states that there have been concerns about sign placement and businesses maintaining the proper distance to keep the sidewalk clear. Commissioners asked questions regarding A-Frame placement and impeding pedestrian right-of-way on the sidewalks.

Commissioner Lewis stated that if you regulate it, then that is saying to the business that it is approved, and once it is approved everyone may ask for it. The question is, if it doesn't put the business at a disadvantage than what is the harm to the business. Commissioner Weiss asked if there was feedback from the business owners. Ms. Dresher said, yes, the business community wants the signs for advertising. Vice Chair Prince asked if there are any other communities that have regulations. Ms. Drescher said yes and provided examples of what other communities are doing to regulate A-Frame signage. Commissioner Radt stated that there are positives to the signs, there placement and height make it easy for wheelchair users to read the information. Commissioner Ludke spoke about a City-wide review of accessibility. Ms. Drescher addressed possible legal challenges to regulation of the signs. Commissioner Lewis said that once the city regulates the signs, that will signal to other businesses that they can have signs. Commission Weiss spoke about the other concerns with accessibility in the city. Commissioners expressed an interest in having Ms. Drescher back later next year to provide an update on this issue.

5. Chair's Report

Chair Poole thanked Vice Chair Prince for running October's meeting. Chair Poole asked that commissioners, for the time being, to identify themselves when they make a motion or second a motion so that the information can be captured accurately in the minutes. Please send ideas and information through the Chair, Vice Chair, and David. As a best practice, if you engage the commission in between meetings, copy the Chair, Vice Chair, and David.

Chair Poole stated that the Housing 2024 Master Plan, which has not been update since 2013, is being worked on and there has been a request for the commission's input. There is a website setup and recordings from the Kick-Off meeting (data, educational webinars and information and opportunities for input and engagement). Chair Poole mentioned that there are concerns with subsidized housing, affordable housing, for persons with disabilities, and land use. Chair Poole states that, if commissioners would like to provided informed targeted feedback, there is a link to the Housing Survey (research.net/r/AlexandriaVA-Housing2040). Chair Poole states that Tamara Jovovic has come to the commission twice before to provide the commission with information, and so, he knows that she would like the commission's input. Commissioner Creighton mentioned that Ms. Jovovic had sent her an email and provided information about the Goals and Principles of the plan. The commission discussed how best to respond to the Housing Survey. The commission decided to respond as individuals and may respond as a commission. Commissioner Creighton will email Ms. Jovovic to tell her how the commission will respond.
