Project Background - History

A force of workmen is employed in opening up the walks, grading the ground and grading an entrance at the new Douglass Memorial cemetery for colored people, on the western outskirts of the city. The owners of the property preparing to erect a monument in the center of the cemetery to the memory of Fred. Douglass.


Alexandria Gazette, October 18, 1895

The Douglass cemetery, the new burying ground for colored people, which has been established here recently, was a day or two ago conveyed by the Washington owners to a board of trustees, consisting of Revs. Porter, Waring, Fields Cook and W. B. Dulaney and M. B. T. Murray, all colored, who will have control of the land in the future and who propose to make the cemetery a very handsome one. The trustees have organized by electing Rev. Porter president; Rev. Fields Cook, vice president, and M. B. T. Murray, secretary and treasurer.

Alexandria Gazette, February 26, 1896

- Established in 1895 as a non-denominational, African American Cemetery in memory of Frederick Douglass (1818-1895).
- In use through 1975 when it was closed.
- 2,256 documented burials
- Headstones: 605 (including footstones and other markers)
- Many burials are unmarked.
- First known burial: 1896. Last known burial: 1975
- City maintained property since 1976

Cemetery boundaries shown in blue. Earliest map of the cemetery.
















- Jacobs Engineering studied the issues.
- Aging, clogged, and undersized stormwater pipe does not properly convey water to and through the cemetery.
- Slope of swale does not promote drainage and water run-off.
- Low spot fills with water during rain events with no overland relief.
- Ownership: in November 2023, the City received a quitclaim deed for one-quarter interest in Douglass Cemetery.




- The grading permit (construction plan) has been approved.

- Plan forthcoming
- Goal is to maintain vehicular traffic in Wilkes Street
- Engineers recommend keeping one lane open on Wilkes at all times and close the other for construction
- Contractor will provide a traffic control plan



Burial Permit

- Previous archaeological testing and existing stormwater pipes suggest discovery of intact burial is unlikely.
- Confirmed that the current pipe probably installed in the 1970s in an existing ditch.
- Recommended archaeological monitoring during construction.
- However, in the unlikely event that a burial is found, and out of an abundance of caution, we have applied for a Burial Permit from the Department of Historic Resources. See copy.
- Directs archaeological actions if a burial is discovered.

A permit from the Director of DHR is required for archaeological recovery of all human skeletal remains and associated artifacts from any unmarked grave, regardless of the age of the burial or archaeological site or ownership of the property.

The DHR establishes the public process.

Burial Permit

Proposed Actions:

- If an intact burial is encountered during monitoring,
 - all work will stop immediately.
 - City Archaeologist, Department of Historic Resources, and Descendant Advisory Group will be notified.
- If the burial cannot be avoided due to the location of construction for the replacement stormwater pipe,
 - the burial will be respectfully and carefully excavated.
 - safely, securely stored in the Archaeological Collections Storage room.
 - construction will continue.
 - osteological analyses will take place.
 - reburial will take place in Douglass Cemetery in close coordination with the Friends of Douglass Cemetery.

Gravestone Conservation

Second Round of Gravestone Conservation:

- Starting on October 27 and for about two weeks, gravestone conservator Howard Wellman will be conserving gravestones on the west side of the cemetery.
- The stones that will be treated during this round of work are high priority and many need their original foundations repaired.
- The determination about which stones need conservation is made as part the Cemetery Preservation Plan (2022).
- Funded by the Virginia African American Cemeteries and Graves Fund.
- Additional work will take place Fall 2026.
